CAR



With training provided by Concern, Nataali advises families in need of nutritional support.

Meet Nataali, a community worker at a clinic in Boyali, Central African Republic. As the civil war worsened in her area, Nataali and her community were forced to flee. And, when they finally returned, they were left with nothing. "Most of the children were sick with malaria and dehydrated," Nataali says. But thanks to the training we were able to provide, Nataali could help her community by teaching her neighbours about their wellbeing. By educating families on malnutrition, they know when to seek aid and improve their health - and she's already seen a change; "Since Concern has come, the amount of malnourished children has reduced."



KENYA

Your kindness is helping Kenyan families break the cycle of poverty. When rising costs caused by drought meant Mwanajuma was unable to afford food, Concern-provided training and water pumps helped her irrigate her land. Part of our Lifesaving Education and Assistance to Farmers (LEAF) Programme, Mwanajuma will soon be able to harvest her first crop of mung beans. Her family is one of almost 7,000 members of the programme who can use these drought-resistant seeds to keep safe from the threat of hunger - giving them the chance to begin building sustainable livelihoods they can rely on for years to come.

SOMALIA

World Water Day 2022 led with the theme. 'Groundwater: Making the Invisible Visible'. For countries like Somalia. where access to water is scarce, groundwater - found in cracks in the earth - is a vital resource.

Part of our World Water Day celebrations included safe water awareness sessions in Somalia's schools. Children learnt all about sanitation and hygiene practices. Meanwhile our partners, YouthLink Somalia, organised community events to spread the message that groundwater is safe to drink. These community events, made possible thanks to your support, are helping students stay healthy, and communities find sustainable sources of water in the climate crisis.



BANGLADESH

Thanks to your generosity, our urban development programme is boosting both the skills and resilience of the Bangladesh community - where we've been working for over 50 years. As part of an exciting project supporting vulnerable families into employment, we've provided grants to women like Laily (below right) to get training and assistance to start her own sewing business. She now earns an income that provides for her family, and trains other local girls so they too can begin supporting themselves.

The full extent of ruin and heartbreak caused by the earthquakes in Turkey and Syria cannot be measured. But thanks to supporters like you, we were able to reach those affected within hours.

At 4.17am local time on Monday, 6th February 2023, a 7.8 magnitude earthquake hit southeast Turkey and neighbouring countries, Syria and Lebanon. The homes, communities and lives of thousands of people were destroyed. Just hours later, a second, 7.5 magnitude quake struck, leaving yet more destruction in its wake. It's estimated that these deadly quakes took the lives of over 50,000 people, and left another 100,000 injured.

Responding within hours

Freezing temperatures, little to no electricity and aftershocks meant rescue efforts were extremely challenging. But with our dedicated staff already on the ground, Concern were able to respond to the crisis within hours of the first earthquake – providing immediate emergency support.

Safe place to sleep

With homes turned to rubble, families were left with little protection from the bitter cold. Our teams constructed sleeping areas in safe buildings, erected tents and provided blankets and mattresses to thousands of people.

Preventing hunger

In addition to the horrific loss of life, at least 870,000 people urgently needed food. Our teams worked around the clock to provide hot meals to those most affected, and made sure clean water was readily available.

Essential kits

Along with shelter and food, Concern made sure vital hygiene kits were also provided to families who had lost everything, protecting them from the spread of disease.

Looking towards the future

With your support, Concern were able to respond swiftly to those greatly affected by the disaster. And, with your kindness, we've continued our life-saving work to get supplies to even the hardest to reach communities. By the end of July 2023, we will have reached over 194,000 people, giving them the means to begin rebuilding their lives again.

Providing foundations to recover and rebuild

When Irmine's building was hit, four of her neighbours were tragically killed.

With nowhere to call home, Irmine and her family came to the Şanlıurfa Exhibition Centre, where they and 9,000 others were given food and blankets by Concern. At such a frightening time, the shelter has been a lifeline for Irmine and her family as they now begin the difficult process of finding a new home.

HERE FOR AS LONG AS IT TAKES


At Concern, protecting those in crisis is a priority. When our work brought us closer to home almost a year and a half ago, your support meant we could reach 65,000 internally displaced Ukrainians. By providing vital monthly food kits and cash transfers, our Concern community helped bring normality to thousands in distress, and gave light to so many in darkness.



Darina* and her 2 ½ year old son Petro* have been living in Ternopil. Ukraine since March 2022. When the fighting and violence reached them, Darina only had time to run. But thanks to Concern and its partners in the Joint Emergency Response for Ukraine (JERU), the family received food assistance and warm clothes quickly. And, when a serious energy crisis swept Ukraine, Darina was given a gas heater to keep them warm in their temporary home. "This feeling of support lifts you up," she says. "When I first came here I was scared of everything... but this support helped to open me up."



Your generosity helps us provide more than just the essentials: it gives people the chance to feel themselves again. When shelling forced librarian Kateryna* to flee home, she felt too scared to sleep - the conflict haunted her dreams. But after arriving at a Concernsupported shelter, she received PSS (psychosocial support) and discovered a library. "You just need things that make your heart warm," she told us. "Your soul iust wants something to lift it up." Kateryna now spends her days at the shelter, reading about love.



In many of the world's most vulnerable communities, the education of girls is often neglected. When income is low, or an extra hand is needed at home, girls are the first to feel the effects – but through your support, we're giving girls the chance to shape their own futures.



When rising fees forced Marystella out of school in Nairobi, Kenya, she was left heartbroken and her ambitions shattered. But with assistance from Concern's 'Let Every Girl Succeed' Programme – also known as Wasichana Wetu Wafaulu – Marystella's future became brighter again.

Thanks to supporters like you,
Marystella was able to receive a
Concern-funded bursary she could
use to complete both her primary and
secondary education. An inspiration
to her siblings, there is no limit on
Marystella's ambitions, as she sets
her sights on going to university to
study teaching or nursing.

And she's not stopping there. After becoming a mentor to other girls aiming to finish their secondary education, Marystella has promised to pass on everything she has learnt to help others fulfil their dreams. "I have goals to achieve," she says. "I want to help my young sisters out there... If it were not for Concern, I don't know where I would be."



Right now, the Horn of Africa is suffering one of the worst droughts in history. Across the region, more than 36 million people are struggling to grow food to eat as land turns dust dry. As a result, over 28 million people in Ethiopia, Kenya and Somalia are facing life-threatening hunger.


But, with generous supporters like you, we can be there to help.

Together, we're delivering urgent assistance to families like Ayaan and her children — including vital cash transfers and therapeutic food, which helps to boost their diets as food grows scarce. And, by introducing longer-term solutions, such as providing drought-resistant seeds and tools, families can grow their own crops — even when rains don't come. Because of support like yours, we can be there for the millions impacted by climate change, providing the life-saving essentials they need.

Q&A

• Can you explain the ongoing crisis in the region?

A To put it simply, five failed rainy seasons, and potentially a sixth on the way, has caused a drought across the Horn of Africa. While droughts are a common phenomenon, because of climate change, the time between one drought and another has reduced. Where historically we'd have ten years between droughts, they're now occurring every two years — so the land has completely dried up.

• How is the drought affecting communities?


A The farming techniques we've relied on for years just don't work anymore. Many are unable to grow their own harvests, causing the price of food to skyrocket. People trek for days to find water and health facilities, and the resilience communities had when facing droughts previously is gone. The drought has caused so many problems – hunger is just one of them.

Q What is Concern doing to help tackle the crisis?

A We have set up nutrition sites in affected communities, where malnourished children and mothers can receive food. We've also provided communities with drought-resistant seeds, training and tools, so they can grow harvests they can rely on, even when the rain doesn't come.

• What can we do to help prevent the crisis getting worse?

A If we all rally together, we can avert the crisis from becoming catastrophic. I always say that whatever little is given will save a life. If we are able to scale up our interventions – which Concern is trying to do – we will not have to declare a famine in parts of the region. We need the support to make sure things don't get worse.



When food is scarce, mothers are often the first to miss meals so their children can eat. For pregnant women, surviving on so little means malnutrition is all the more likely. And, for their unborn children, malnutrition puts them at greater risk of undernourishment and premature death.

But your support is helping us break the cycle.

In Pakistan's Umerkot District, expectant mother Jamna was surviving on leftovers to protect her young family, leaving her weak and in pain.

But, with the help of your generous donations, Concern teams were able to reach and diagnose Jamna with acute malnutrition six months into her pregnancy. Providing assistance in five key areas – breastfeeding, complementary feeding, micronutrient supplements, pregnancy supplements and management – Jamna received the support she needed. And, as Jamna grew stronger, so did her baby, who was getting the nutrients they needed to begin life stronger and healthier.
