Here are just a few of the inspiring projects you've helped make happen this year.



UKRAINE

Lesya* and her family became displaced within Ukraine when they fled from the violence. While they found safe shelter, the conditions left them at risk to harsh weather – but emergency cash transfers from Concern helped to keep them safe.

"This money has been a tremendous help," Lesya told us. "Not only are we using it to repair the roof, but we've also set aside a certain amount for firewood and purchased fuel. It has also allowed me to buy medicine when the children fell ill."

CENTRAL AFRICAN REPUBLIC

In the Central African Republic, your generosity is helping women like Fardos out of poverty. Supported by Concern and our partners, Fardos has been able to grow her dressmaking business with new work tools and training in both management and sewing skills. She's already earning more and building savings to protect her livelihood. She beamed as she told us, "I can provide for myself and my family."



GAZA

Right now, Gaza is facing a catastrophic humanitarian crisis, with tens of thousands of lives lost and homes destroyed. When security and access allow, our trusted NGO partner in Gaza, working through the ongoing support of the community, will resume the distribution of urgent supplies in both Rafah and De al-Balah. This includes delivering life-saving food, as well as water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) services, to meet the increasing needs.



BUILDING FROM THE GROUND UP

The support Jean received from Concern's Green Graduation Programme helped him grow food for his family, set up a thriving business and begin dreaming of the future.

In some of Rwanda's provinces, chronic malnutrition and poverty have left people desperately struggling. But thanks to the generosity of people like you, Concern has been able to support thousands of families out of hardship.

"We only ate once a day"

In Muganza village, food shortages meant Jean and his family could only eat once a day. "Life was not easy," he said. "Finding food and earning money was hard." Without a plot of land to grow crops, there was a constant danger of malnutrition and Jean knew his family was at risk.

Supporting a blossoming business

It was while searching for work that Jean was invited to join Concern's Green Graduation Programme – an initiative dedicated to supporting people living in extreme poverty to find a pathway out of it. Jean was given funds and training to set up his own business and was also taught how to grow vegetables.

"I was determined to have a business – I put my strength into it," Jean told us. At first, he bought plots of land, which he sold to make a profit and open up his own shop. He was able to harvest food at the same time, including 100kg of beans!

But his entrepreneurial spirit didn't stop there. Jean recognised a profitable opportunity, and a great way to support the environment: with the income raised from his shop, he bought land to plant a forest as a long-term investment.

Towards the future

"When I put my skills together with the training and advice I received – it helped me," Jean says. Now, his family buys what they need from their profits. And he has bigger dreams too: "I want to focus on growing the forest. If we sell it, we can help our child continue studying. I want to be a good example to my family."





Our Country Director for Yemen, Victor Moses, is on the ground leading this life-saving programme. Here he describes how

you're supporting families in one of the world's worst humanitarian crises.

When Fr. Aengus Finucane, one of Concern's founders, was asked to describe our community's mission, he said; "Do as much as you can, as well as you can, as long as you can, for as many as you can."

It's that commitment that led to the launch of our first programme in Yemen, where more than 18 million people are in need of humanitarian assistance.

Over the past few months, the Concern community has been part of a crisis response programme. By focusing on three key areas – Health, Nutrition and Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) – supporters like you have helped us bring critical support to families in need. And that's only the beginning.

Since conflict broke out in 2014, one in eight people have been forced from their homes, into camps without basic facilities and where only the luckiest are able to share a latrine. There has been a tragic rise in hunger and preventable diseases, such as cholera, which children are particularly vulnerable to, and scarcely available water has become a luxury.

Our teams and partners are working tirelessly to support families. We've set up health clinics where we provide free services and vaccinations for children. Our volunteers refer anyone who needs treatment, and they also distribute cholera and hygiene kits to prevent the



spread of diseases. In various camps, we're also constructing toilets to improve sanitation, and solarising wells and a borehole so more people can access safe water.

The generosity of Concern supporters has had a hugely positive impact. It's meant we can provide critical services to thousands of people suffering from years of conflict, disease outbreaks and displacement. Thank you, Concern community, for the support and goodwill you have shown so far.

The work we're doing here is invaluable. As a community, we have already done so much in such a short time. But we cannot ignore the ongoing cries of people. Please continue to support our vital work, thank you.

THE POWER OF PORRIDGE

As the impacts of the climate crisis push families in Niger into hunger, you're helping provide the innovative flour that's saving lives. After food shortages left Aminatou with little to protect her family, she had no choice but to watch as her 10-month-old son grew weak with hunger. But thankfully, with help from Concern, Aminatou was able to receive six kilos of fortified flour – flour packed full of the vitamins and proteins a child needs to stay safe from malnutrition.

As well as receiving flour, Aminatou attended a cooking demonstration held by our team, where she learnt to make nutritious porridge for her little boy. This innovative programme is helping protect more children from malnutrition.

THE FUTURE: SUPPORTED BY YOU

In Malawi's Mwanza district, a devastating combination of drought and flooding destroyed Elvis' land, leaving her farming group unable to grow crops. As their harvests failed, the group lost more of their income – which meant they had less food to feed their families.

But with funds raised largely by legacy supporters, Concern's local team was able to share innovative new farming techniques with the farmers to overcome immediate challenges, as well as the long-term impacts of climate change — a powerful lasting legacy from gifts left in Wills.

"We used to use buckets for irrigation, but after receiving a solar pump from Concern, we could work faster and expand," Elvis explained. "We were able to harvest a lot, we don't struggle."

It's because of those who have left a gift in their Will to Concern that Elvis and her group have begun building long-term resilience against climate change. It's the first step to protecting their harvests, a powerful legacy that future members will be able to rely on for generations to come.

In some of the world's most vulnerable areas, we're helping women become self-sufficient and break the cycle of poverty.

When Salma in Dhaka, Bangladesh, received personal business training and a grant from Concern to kickstart her jewellery-making business, she had no idea just how successful she'd be.

Despite starting off small, Salma now has over 40 staff, many of whom are women. She's bought the office where she works and has made enough income to move to a more secure home and send her daughter to school.

And her aspirations haven't stopped there. After receiving gender equality training, Salma has become a councillor, helping others in the local area: "I help to solve problems. Women come to me for help, but I've also helped make developments in the community."
