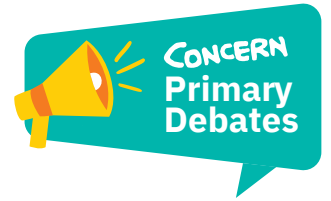


ACTION PLANNING



Before we begin, take some time to reflect as a class on some of these questions:



Are having sympathy and empathy the same?

Sympathy: Caring about someone's feelings and recognising that they are upset or having a hard time, but not feeling or understanding it as deeply as they do. This might be seen as pity or "feeling sorry for them".

Empathy: Understanding how someone else feels and being able to share or imagine those feelings. It means really trying to "step into their shoes" and connect with what they are going through.



What is the difference between charity and solidarity?

Charity: Giving help, support, or resources to someone who needs it. It often comes from kindness and a desire to make things better for others.

Solidarity: Standing alongside others and supporting them as equals. It means working together, sharing responsibility, and helping create fairness for everyone, not just offering help from the outside.

Understanding these different meanings helps us think about how we treat other people. While sympathy and charity are mostly good natured and important, empathy and solidarity can help us go a step further. Empathy helps us truly understand and connect with how others feel, and solidarity encourages us to stand beside others and work together as equals.

When we practise empathy and solidarity, we build stronger communities, create fairness, and make our world a more caring place for everyone.
